FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

As we face the New Year and all its possibilities and potential, I send a prayer for understanding and compassion. In light of increasing awareness of racist policing, mass incarceration and the school to prison pipeline, many are beginning to wake up. People are disrupting traffic and social events to bring attention to the egregious practices being done in our name. It is an attempt to say business as usual should not continue as long as people are being brutalized. And that call is being heard in the cry Black Lives Matter.

The call *Black Lives Matter* is not to say that all lives don't matter- but rather to highlight the fact that black men are about 30 times more likely to be shot by police than whites. This is why I choose not use the phrase "All Lives Matter" in the context of this struggle. As long as an assumption is made that black men and boys are inherently dangerous, and deserve to be approached with lethal force no matter what the circumstances, I will continue to use the phrase "*Black Lives Matter*".

I know that all lives matter, this has been a core belief for me as long as I can remember. And I continue to witness a world that values some people, white people, more than others. It frustrates me that about 50 years ago Ella Baker said: "Until the killing of black men, black mothers' sons, becomes as important to the rest of the country as the killing of a white mother's son..." We who believe in freedom cannot rest. So we begin to awaken from our slumber, from our rest, as we recognize that this calling, this plea, remains unfulfilled.

And, it is vital to remember that **not all police officers** behave in racist and violent ways. The institutional racism that persists has tendrils in economic inequality, educational inequality, the assumption that the poor are more likely to commit violent crimes and the false assumption that people of color use drugs at a rate higher than whites. To address the problem of mass incarceration, the school to prison pipeline and the unnecessary deaths of young black men, we must address the underlying causes, not just the obvious results of institutional racism.

Institutions are made of people and we, we are the ones who can change things by engaging in our lives, practicing kindness and compassion, and learning more about how those of us with privilege and be good allies. We can engage in the civic life of our community, our city. We can model kindness and compassion and seek it in others- we can change the way our institutions work by changing ourselves.

The new President of our west coast seminary, Starr King School for the Ministry, Rev. Rosemary Bray-McNatt offers these words as we embrace the struggle for justice in our hearts and in the streets:

Gracious spirit of all our lives, God of many names and many voices

And one abundant love:

At this time of holy unrest, give us the peace that comes When we know why we struggle and what we struggle for.

Spirit of life in all its fullness, renew us and remind us that we who have answered your call

Were never promised ease, or wealth, or appreciation.

Help us to remember that honor and praise are yours, not ours. Remind us that we serve the great cause of justice, not ourselves.

Give us, we pray, a true joy in the community we form each time we gather

To pray, to march, to interrupt ordinary time to create sacred time, a time to help others awaken to what is so very wrong in our world.

Help us to be kind, even to those with whom we struggle. Help us to be, in the raising of our voices and the marching of our feet, agents of a radical love that holds us all.

Finally, help us to be grateful, grateful to live in these times when great works of justice await our hands and hearts and minds and spirit. Prepare us so that we might do all that is in our power to change this world, so that the whole creation might see Beloved Community, not tomorrow, but today. We ask these things in the name of all that is holy. Amen

BOOK CLUB


The Book Club meets on the first Tuesday of each month. Please join us in the History Room at 6:30pm on Tuesday, January 6th.


Ed owned Crowell's Frame Store and Art Gallery. More than just a store and gallery it was a salon. One always knew went you entered the store that there would be a new person Ed would introduce you to and a very provocative discussion which would always include all who were there. The discussion was always sparked by Ed's quick sense of humor that you could see coming in his sparkling blue mischievous eyes. Crowell's was a special place and a gathering place. You could go in and spend no money to be convivial.

He left home at an early age, traveling to Florida looking for work and adventure. He joined the Navy to see the world and get a tattoo that he



When he moved back East to his home state of Rhode Island, he went from designing store front windows to Bo Bernstein's ad agency. And not too many years later moving to Dartmouth and purchasing Crowell's Art Gallery and Frame Shop with Barbara, he began to decorate the homes of the elite, to mentor folks struggling with alcoholism and fight for the disempowered both locally and internationally with his participation on the brigade to Nicaragua. Ed and Barbara were active members of the yacht club, the Chamber of Commerce and the Historical Society. In his youth, Ed played soccer and to his last days he loved to watch national and international soccer matches on television. Ed and his daughter Stephanie were avid cribbage players.
