FROM THE MINISTER'S DESK

This month we invite you all to participate in our annual Stewardship Drive. Each year we ask the members and friends of the church to contribute to the care of this Beloved Community. We hope that each of you will consider what the church means to you and how much it makes a difference in your life. The pledges we collect allow us to budget for another year as we consider staffing, programming and the general care and upkeep of our beautiful building. While we do have income from the Thrift Shop and from rental of the building, we rely on heavily on pledges to help facilitate the programming we offer and the work we do.

I know that some have been confused in the past about how pledging works. So here is a quick run down: Each pledge is made for our fiscal year which runs from July I thru June 30 of the following year. That means that the pledge you make now begins July Ist and helps us plan the budget for the coming year. The more money we raise through pledges, the more we can do. When you make a pledge, you fill out a "pledge card" that asks for a total amount. The pledge is an annual commitment, so we do not expect anyone to pay their pledge in a single payment. Most people pay their pledge monthly, weekly or sometimes quarterly. We also know that sometimes people experience changes that make it impossible to fulfill their commitment.

We hope that when you make your pledge, you will be generous and that your pledge will reflect the depth of meaning that this church has in your life. It takes many hands to build the Beloved Community, please let us include yours! Join us for the Stewardship Potluck on March 23.

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Update on Restorative Justice Project:

Last month, after a number of conversations with School Counselor Lynn Markey and Principal Wharly Williams, Nan and I started training a hand picked group of students, teachers and counselors at Whaling City High School to lead restorative circles. The students and staff are responding positively. We hope to engage more of the school in community building circles and we expect to begin holding Conferencing Circles (circles related to specific issues or harms) in early March. We are also applying for a small grant through the courts to facilitate our work there as well. We hope, if all goes well, to train the court staff and volunteers to begin accepting cases in September.

the possibility of working with them.

We will be holding a Community Information Session on March 2 from 4-6pm in the Parish Hall. This is an introduction to Restorative Justice and will provide general information on how it can be used both formally and informally. This is the second community session we have scheduled and we hope to hold at least six or eight more throughout the city.

Membership at First Unitarian Church

We have welcomed many new members in the last two years and we are always pleased when someone makes a choice to join our church.

In its recent report on *Belonging*, the Commission on Appraisal wrote: "Membership is a journey, both for the individual and the congregation. It is not just a technical or legal state, nor only a numerical measurement. It is a process that engages human beings and takes us from a starting place to a new place." We hope to be a place where people can find a deep sense of belonging, where they can learn new things about themselves and the world, where identity can be shaped and where generosity of the spirit can be offered to those seeking to belong. This "Spiral of the Spirit" is our method for building the Beloved Community. Inspired by ancient traditions the Spiral of the Spirit provides a framework for belonging, personal growth, caring for one another and outreach to the wider community.

Membership in First Unitarian Church is relatively easy, but not simple. Easy, because it only requires that one sign our membership book. We also ask each person to attend a New UU Class and though it is not a requirement, the class provides some basic background in UU history, a little history of our church, nuts and bolts, and a chance to get to know others. Membership is challenging because building the Beloved Community takes hard work and care. We invite you to join us in this work. We invite you live a life of integrity, service and love.

WORSHIPTHEMESFORTHEYEAR

March Worship Theme:

This month *Kindness* is our focus. Synonyms include: benevolence, hospitality, understanding and compassion. Kindness and compassion are, for me, at the center of the Golden Rule.

Kindness is something we are taught as children. I remember as a child, watching Mr. Rogers and really wanting to be like him; gentle, kind and curious. Kindness is something we need, every day, in all our lives if the world is to change. The more violence in our world, the more violence there will be. The Buddha said; "Hatred does not cease by hatred, but only by love; this is the eternal rule."

It costs us nothing to be kind to others, in fact, research is showing that the more kindness we express to others, the better we feel. The feeling of kindness passes from person to person, like a chain of good will. Kindness triggers certain receptors in the brain and can change the chemical reactions in our brain. Practicing kindness leads to better health. It has to begin somewhere, so why not with us.

There is a phrase I recall from my days in grade school, our teacher asked us to think before we speak and to consider; "Is what we are about to say true? Is it necessary? Is it kind?" these words have been attributed to the Buddha, to Socrates and to a number of yogis and gurus. These spiritual leaders remind us that it is important to be disciplined in our speech, because our speech has an impact on others. If we can be thoughtful about our speech and our intention, we are much more likely to be kind to others.
